Response: Title I information is shared at our Title I Annual Meetings, School Advisory Council Meetings and our monthly calendars as well. We also provide parents with a Title I Handbook that provides all of the above information. Teachers provide weekly newsletters to help parents better understand the curriculum and what assessments will be administered. The school calendar and Title I information is also included on our school website. Hilliard Elementary School will hold its Title I Annual Meeting at the beginning of the school year. Parents will receive important information about Title 1 and how this status works to support students and families at Hilliard Elementary School. The information included are parent rights as Title I parent, state academic standards, and ways to help at home. Individual class and grade level information is sent home in a hard copy on a weekly basis. Student progress information is also made available to parents in multiple formats on a regular basis (every two weeks at a minimum).

Response: Parents have multiple opportunities to meet and participate in decisions relating to the education of their children through the School Advisory Council, Volunteering, Surveys, the PTO, and Parent Teacher Conferences. Hilliard Elementary School will host numerous events and meetings that promote parental and family involvement. Meals are provided as appropriate to facilitate parental involvement after a long day at work. We have found that parents and families are much more likely to attend when meals are included. Activities are provided for all age groups to promote family involvement. Activities are held at a variety of times and days to improve parent participation. **Response**: Parents meet each year to discuss changes and updates to our School-Parent Compact. Our School Improvement Team, with representatives from all stakeholders, reviews our current School-Parent Compact and makes suggestions for any changes to better address our needs. **Response**: The Title I Handbook will include information on their rights as Title I parents, as well as state academic standards. Individual class and grade level information is sent home in a hard copy on a weekly basis. Academic information/grades are always provided real time on the student FOCUS program for parents to keep up to date. With the implementation of the BEST standards, we have developed a new parent night to inform and equip parents with additional ways they can help at home as well as ask questions about their child's progress with school personnel.

Response: A great tool that is provided to every parent on a weekly basis is our classroom newsletters. Teachers provide up-to-date information about student studies and provide information so that parents may work with students to improve student achievement. In addition, a variety of parental involvement opportunities are made available to parents to provide them with training and materials needed to work with their student at home in the area of reading, math, and science. During our parent nights, we are placing a strong emphasis on parent-teacher relationships with conversation starters, insight into the standards, games to help provide more books into each student's home, and key information on how parents can put the new standards into real life practice at home. We teach parents about our various computer programs including Benchmark Advance, iReady, Renaissance Place, IXL, and Lexia. We also send home multi-sensory reading kits and books to read nightly, so that parents can work on key reading skills with their child.

**Response**: Our Reading Coach has been instrumental in assisting teachers with engaging, multisensory activities to assist parents as they work with students at home. She provides training for our paraprofessionals to better equip them for work in the classroom and after school tutoring. Through video and peer coaching we will increase communication in how to improve. Our SAC team is instrumental in bringing teachers and parents together in a meaningful way to bond the two partner groups in the common goal of assisting our students. Additional efforts are being made to inform and instruct both teachers as well as parents on new standards and curriculum.

**Reponses**: Many of our activities include make and take opportunities, or provide parents with learning materials to aide their participation in their child's education and success. Additional parental involvement programs and activities are coordinated with the school district to provide parents assistance and encourage full participation in their child's education. Examples include: Liaison for intervention and services, Child Find, CARRT, Family Matters of Nassau County, FIT program, and DARE program.
